

Local Parks Get Some Help from Oysters

Tampa Bay Watch recently wrapped up a series of oyster shell projects at local City of St. Petersburg parks. The city was concerned with erosion along the shorelines of Maximo Park, Abercrombie Park and Bay Vista Park, so they partnered with us to install oyster shell bars. For instance, the southwestern shoreline of Maximo Park is located along a busy boating channel that serves the parks' boat ramp, an adjacent marina, and is a connection to Middle Boca Ciega Bay and Gulfport, so the



installment of oyster habitats will help with erosion of all three of the park's shorelines and promote oyster habitats to improve water quality to these parts of the bay.

Successful Crab Trap Removal Event

On March 5, Tampa Bay Watch recovered 32 derelict crab traps from the areas of the Little Manatee River and the Cockroach Bay Aquatic Preserve. This event was made possible with the help of five volunteers airboats from the Florida Airboat Association and 22 community volunteers and generous funding support from the SeaWorld & Busch Gardens Conservation Fund.

The primary objective of the project is to remove abandoned traps from the environment and to reduce unnecessary entrapment of marine organisms, such as blue crabs, stone crabs, small commercial and recreationally important fish, and brackish water turtles. The traps were collected by a partner organization called ReelCycle who upcycled the traps into a renewable resource as opposed to being discarded in a landfill.



What is a VOG?

Tampa Bay Watch recently installed 60 Vertical Oyster Gardens (VOGs) along the CITGO terminal in downtown Tampa. It's an innovative technique to improve water quality in an urbanized commercial setting.

VOGs are suspended from docks to create a hard substrate



where juvenile oysters can attach and develop. Oysters are natural filters, cleaning up to ten gallons of water per hour. More oysters mean a cleaner bay!
