Annual Report

Tampa Bay Watch has grown tremendously over the last 28 years of operation. Our mission has been focused on mobilizing the Tampa Bay community to participate in restoration and education programs. We have coordinated more than 250,000 volunteers, students, and campers, installed 15,000 oyster reef ball units and 2,500 tons of oyster shell to create miles of oyster shell reef communities, planted more than 1,000,000 salt marsh grass plants to restore 250 acres of coastal tidal ponds to Tampa Bay, and we still have much more to accomplish!

Now that the Discovery Center is up and running, our staff and board members identified this time as ideal to develop a new strategic plan to address the growth and needs of our operation. We developed a new vision and mission statement to reflect our goal to enact impactful change in support of the organization, our community, and the environment. The intent of the plan is to take Tampa Bay Watch to the next level of growth, addressing needs and infrastructure to ensure it will be an environmental mainstay for many generations

Out of the pandemic: A new normal, a renewed vision

Letter from the president



Peter Clark, founder and president

Our crew began 2021 with cautious hope to get back to normal as vaccinations became available for COVID-19. The spring restoration projects continued to be supported by a small group of super volunteers and field trips were only available for private schools, home school groups, and community organizations.

Tampa Bay encountered a major setback in the spring through an emergency release of 215 million gallons of contaminated water from the aging stacks of Piney Point, the site of a former phosphate processing plant in Manatee County. Excessive nutrients in the bay resulted in a series of red tide and algal blooms

over the summer with fish and marine animal deaths, a negative impact on tourism, and decreased quality of life for residents. The bloom prevented our summer campers from getting in the water and forced us to cancel the annual Great Bay Scallop Search.

As the bloom eased, our fall restoration projects were opened back up to the public for volunteering and public schools were back to school field trips. Evening for the Bay, our fall fundraiser, returned by hosting over 300 guests on our lawn. The Discovery Center launched a new eco-vessel to educate locals and visitors alike on the bounty of Tampa Bay.

Now more than ever, we need your help to invest in the protection and restoration of Tampa Bay in order to prevent further deterioration. We must advocate for measures to ensure the Tampa Bay region is prepared to maintain and improve water quality well into the future. Each volunteer, member, partner, and sponsor plays a key role in the important work that we do at Tampa Bay Watch. Thank you all!

Record Red Tide in Tampa Bay

Worst outbreak since 1971

The algae that causes red tide is naturally found in the waters of Tampa Bay and the Gulf of Mexico. Unfortunately in the summer of 2021, Tampa Bay and the Gulf of Mexico experienced a significant bloom.

215 million gallons of wastewater was dispersed from Piney Point from March 30 to April 9, 2021. The estimated nutrient load from this incident is equivalent to approximately 200,000+ bags of fertilizer delivered over the course of one or two weeks.

The additional nutrients coupled with lack of rainfall in May and the amount of nitrogen and phosphorus in the water fueled the bloom with no end in sight. The effects of the red tide bloom continued for months due to the abundance of nutrients in the bay fueling the bloom of the red tide.

The effects of the red tide have not only impacted our estuary and cherished marine life, but also directly impacted our economy as local businesses such as

restaurants, hotels, tourism destinations, and charters. Red tide prevented visitors from spending the tourism dollars that our local economy depends on, and residents from enjoying the beauty and activities that make living here so appealing.



Discovery Center Records Successful Year The Tampa Bay Watch Discovery
Center on the St. Pete Pier
continued to work towards the
goal to advance environmental
stewardship by engaging, informing,
and inspiring visitors to the St.
Pete Pier about the recovery of
Tampa Bay. In 2021, the Discovery
Center had 50,578 visitors and
over 20,000 participants in free
environmental education programs.
The center educates local, national,
and international visitors of all

ages about the importance and value of protecting the marine environment. Eighty-three percent of the visitors are from Florida, with the majority being local (Pinellas & Hillsborough Counties), so there is a great opportunity for increased awareness locally.

The Discovery Center launched a brand new 45' USCG-certified catamaran at the St. Pete Pier in 2021. This floating classroom—the *MV Discovery*—was launched thanks to the generosity of The Spurlino Foundation, and provides on-thewater family-friendly public cruises and private field trips throughout the week. Eco-tours explore Tampa Bay history and the marine life you'll find in and above the bay. Activities include a fisheries trawl, bird spotting and identifying specific traits, and dolphin and manatee

identification and behaviors, all while enjoying a relaxing bay cruise.

Restoration:

The act of restoring; renewal, revival, or reestablishment; the state or fact of being restored; a return of something to a former, original, normal, or unimpaired condition; restitution of something taken away or lost.









Declining Sea Grasses

Ten-year low recorded



There are three main species of seagrass in Tampa Bay: manatee, shoal, and turtle grass.

Scientists with the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) released the results of their 2020 seagrass mapping study showing that between 2018 and 2020, Tampa Bay has lost approximately 16% of our seagrass habitat for a total that is a 10-year low of 34,297 acres. It is believed that this could be the result of a wetter rainfall pattern that we have seen over the last couple of years that is resulting in the greater availability of nutrients in the bay which has caused some die-offs. Another cause is a greater abundance of attached algae which can be out-competing seagrass.

Seagrass has many benefits to Tampa Bay: it is a vital nursery habitat for marine animals, it helps stabilize shifting sands on the bottom of the bay and improves water clarity by trapping

fine sediments and particles.
Documenting the extent of seagrass and how it changes overtime is a valuable tool for scientists throughout Florida as seagrasses are an important barometer of a bay's health because they require relatively clean water to flourish, thus they are sensitive to changes in water clarity and quality.

What can you do to help?

 Consider native plants instead of grass. Ask yourself which is more important: a green lawn, or a blue Tampa Bay?

- Volunteer and/or support Tampa Bay Watch
- Contact your elected officials at the local and state level (city council representatives, congressional representatives) and ask them to commit to stronger water quality protections, to support continued monitoring, and to fund emergency cleanup efforts.
- Follow county ordinances of summertime fertilizer bans.

Restoration by the numbers

Projects persevered despite the pandemic



Oyster shell bars

Improving water quality by reducing shoreline erosion and promoting oyster habitats. **72** volunteers created **2,000** square feet of oyster reef with **35** tons of fossilized oyster shell.



Oyster reef balls

Stabilizing shorelines, building hard-bottom habitats for wildlife, enhancing water quality. **702** volunteers built **950** oyster reef balls and installed **1,060**.



Coastal cleanups

Protecting wildlife and people from trash and marine debris that floats onto shorelines. **161** volunteers removed **3,097** pounds of debris through coastal cleanups and a derelict crab trap removal.



Fishing line recycling

Helping protect wildlife from unnecessary injury or death by collecting and recycling monofilament fishing line.

63 volunteers recovered and recycled 583 miles of fishing line from 212 monotubes.



Native plantings

Strengthening healthy shorelines to withstand effects of storms and provide essential habitat. **78** volunteers estored **18,263** square feet of shoreline through the planting of **12,300** plugs of native grasses.

Generous Support Brings New Faculty Name

Tierra Verde Marine Education Center becomes Auer Marine Education Center

Tampa Bay Watch is thrilled to announce that the Auer Family has generously funded the program and building improvements to the Tampa Bay Watch education center in Tierra Verde. The building currently named Tampa Bay
Watch Marine Education Center
will now be known as "Auer
Marine Education Center." The
Marine Education Center is
the base for the established
Estuary EDventures educational
program. The funding provided
by the Auer Family will help
Estuary EDventures continue
to enhance and evolve the
program's reach and capacity,
provide resources to run

existing programming and staff, and also allow the creation of new STEM and Citizen Science programming and curriculum for both on-site and off-site participants.

This critical support will allow Estuary EDventures to continue offering free and reduced-cost programming to Title I and academically atrisk schools and community

members, which currently accounts for more than 50% of Estuary EDventures programming. The Auer Family's donation also provides resources to help with the upkeep, management, and enhancement of the 2,500 sq. ft. educational classroom space. This community classroom includes observation tanks, an outdoor wet lab, collective 10,000-gallon openair observation tanks, the 32-foot Beach Cat classroom vessel, and Palm, the Ornate Diamondback Terrapin, our original resident animal ambassador.

Each of these components are critical to the success of the Estuary EDventures programming serving Tampa Bay's children.

New Terrapin Exhibit at the Discovery Center

In addition to the enhancements to our education building and programs, the Auer Family also gifted a new terrapin exhibit at the Tampa Bay Watch Discovery Center on the St. Pete Pier.

The 240-gallon exhibit is home to Bertha and Ruby, two rare Ornate Diamondback Terrapins, classified as vulnerable species. The exhibit teaches visitors all about terrapins and what makes them different from turtles and tortoises.

The diamondback terrapin is the only turtle in the U.S. that inhabits estuaries, tidal creeks, and salt marshes where the salinity often comes close to that of the ocean. It thrives in estuaries like Tampa Bay where it can dine on crabs, snails, shrimp, fish, mussels, clams and other crustaceans.

Summer camps

Day camps give kids the opportunity to explore the bay by snorkel, kayak, and boat. **99** summer campers participated in **35** days of camp. **9** were provided scholarships.



iSeahorse

A database for monitoring global seahorse populations and conservation efforts. **305** students identified **26** seahorses.



Bay Grasses in Classes

School-based native plant nursery program growing native plants. **740** students in **11** schools restored **6,070** square feet of shoreline by planting **2,281** plugs of native grasses.



Florida Microplastic Awareness Project

Supported by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). **98** volunteers and **84** students were educated in FMAP program.



Field trips and virtual education

Engaged **1,133** local school children on **80** immersive field trips and served **1,167** students through virtual education.



Earth Echo database monitoring

62 students collected local water samples and contributed their findings to Earth Echo's database monitoring the health of the world's oceans.














Financial snapshot
