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Native Wetland Planting Program Expands into Community

Our restoration team is expanding our native planting program by developing wetland plant nurseries in public locations, in collaboration with key restoration partners. Earlier this year, we established two community nurseries at Robinson Preserve, in partnership with Manatee County's Natural Resources Department staff, and finished planting the nurseries in May. Our native plantings help to restore

valuable wetland habitats that provide numerous benefits for our water bodies, promote biodiversity, improve water quality, and provide unique habitats for wildlife.

We are excited to announce the establishment of a new

school wetland nursery at Autism Inspired Academy! Being a part of the program provides the opportunity for students to participate in hands-on restoration of degraded wetland habitats around the Tampa Bay watershed. Students are

responsible for the maintenance of their on-site salt marsh nursery, as well as transplanting to a restoration site and recycling the nursery to begin the cycle again.

"Native plants sustain the incredible variety of natural habitats in the Tampa Bay area and are highly valued by the native wildlife that have adapted to live with these plants.

Our native planting projects are a tool for helping to restore that balance and restore lost habitats that play a vital role in maintaining the health of our environment," states Tara Kok, Tampa Bay Watch Native Planting Program Coordinator.

A big thank you to all the AIA students and staff, Manatee County staff, and the volunteers who helped to construct and plant these newly established nurseries, and for taking part in our native planting program to help restore the health of Tampa Bay.



Did you know...

Natural coastal habitat can result in huge savings when it comes to storm protection. According to **coastalresilience.org**, 0.5 square miles of restored wetland habitat will avert approximately \$37-252 million in damages in the Tampa Bay area.




18th Annual Tarpon Rodeo Best Yet

False Arrow Crab

METOPORHAPHIS CALCARATA

CHARACTERISTICS: Rough triangular carapace and spines at their leg joints. **HABITAT:** Found in the Gulf of Mexico and its bays.

Crew members aboard Tampa Bay Watch's eco-vessel recently found a false arrow crab. True arrow crabs—or yellowline arrow crabs—are found on coral reefs and have yellow lines on their smooth carapace.

Tampa Bay Watch will be recruiting volunteers to participate in the Great Bay Scallop Search on **Saturday**, **August 19** by snorkeling selected sites within Boca Ciega and Lower Tampa Bay for bay scallops. The goal of the event is to monitor and document the health and status of the bay scallop population.

We mainly recruit volunteers with shallow draft boats, but have limited spots for canoes and kayaks. We also accept registrations from snorkelers without boats, but participation depends on a boater having room for you aboard their vessel.
